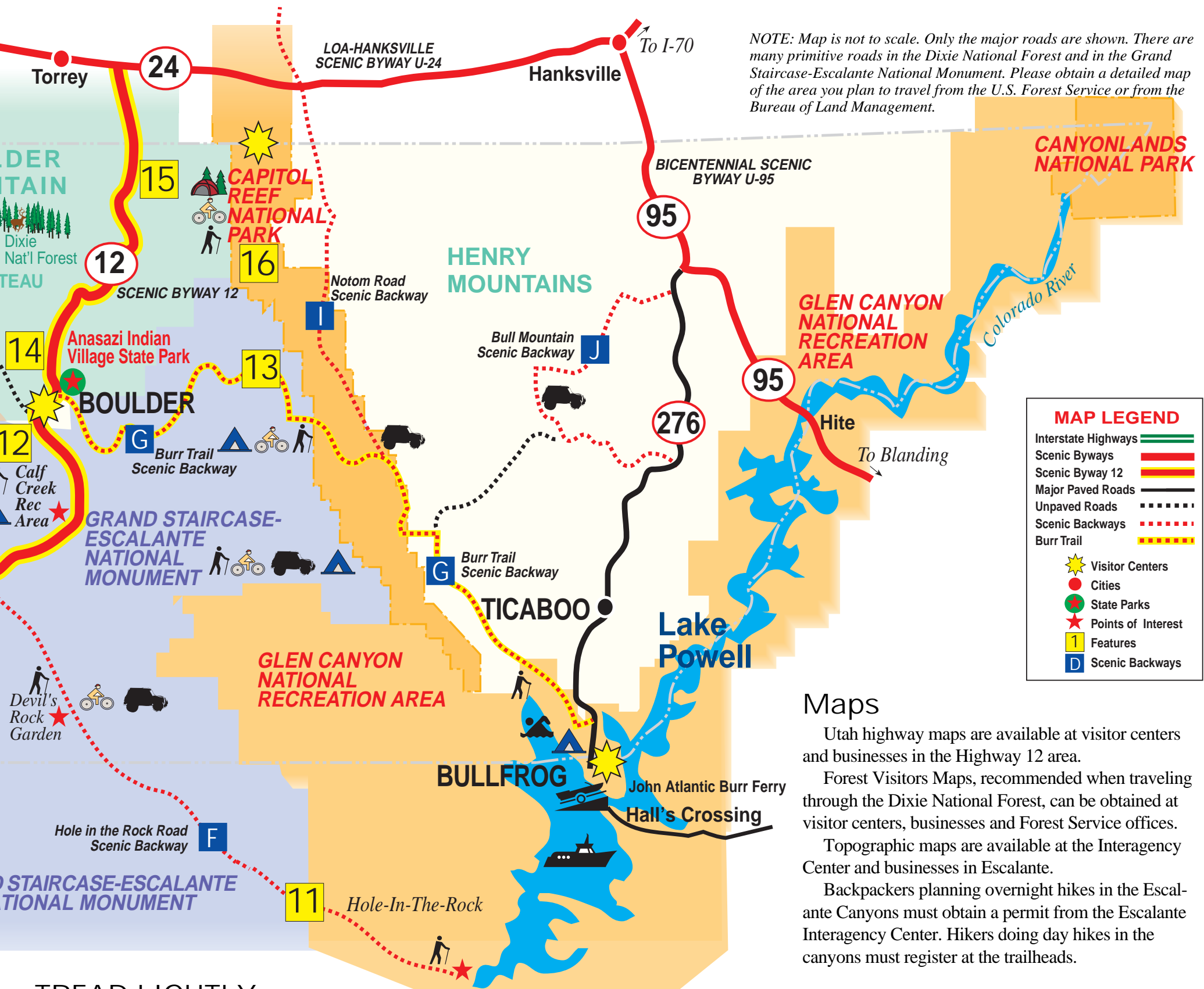

### Maps

Utah highway maps are available at visitor centers and businesses in the Highway 12 area.

Forest Visitors Maps, recommended when traveling through the Dixie National Forest, can be obtained at visitor centers, businesses and Forest Service offices.

Topographic maps are available at the Interagency Center and businesses in Escalante.

Backpackers planning overnight hikes in the Escalante Canyons must obtain a permit from the Escalante Interagency Center. Hikers doing day hikes in the canyons must register at the trailheads.

### Weather

A dry climate with lots of sunny days is normal for this area of the country. Weather can change quickly, however, and thunderstorms are common during the summer months. Daytime temperatures are pleasant in the summer; nights are generally cool. Winter brings snow to the high country and exceptionally clear skies throughout the area.
